Federated Searching is a new, more powerful searching tool that allows users to search through online resources on topics like business, news and current events, education, health and medicine, history, newspapers and science journals. These results appear alongside books that you can check out from the library.

To use this new search, go to <http://pac.theoceancountylibrary.org/polaris>, click on "Keyword Search" and then on "Select Databases," which allows you to search up to 10 databases in addition to the library catalog.

He is a member of the Monmouth Ocean Education Services Commission's Board of Directors, a member of the NJ Association of School Administrators, and a member and Past-President of the Ocean County Association of School Administrators.

Ravally is also an adjunct professor at Georgian Court University's Graduate School of Education.
